1940s

A year after national media coverage of his “graduation” from Cornell 80 years after he left to serve in WWII, the media covered **Fred Taylor '43** again during his honors flight trip to Normandy for the 80th anniversary of D-Day. He and other veterans were greeted at the Paris airport by French citizens carrying photos of each veteran; the photo Fred submitted was his wedding picture with his late wife **Peggy E. Newberg Taylor '46**. He said the people greeted them as if it were the liberation all over again. One of his escorts along the way was a young soldier also from Linn County (Fred grew up in Springville)—see the media coverage at crnl.co/dday or use the QR code. He returned home to La Mesa, California, happy, yet emotionally and physically taxed. During the trip he often thought about his classmates, like **Robert Hill '43**, who also enlisted, but are no longer with us to commemorate their effort. Back home, Fred represented WWII veterans in a Fourth of July parade in Coronado, California.



1950s

The Rev. **Fred Morris '55** has published his memoir, “Raising Hell for Jesus: Seven Decades of Faith, Courage, and Chasing the Impossible Dream.” His career as a Methodist minister ranges from starting the fastest-growing church in northern Illinois, to befriending Brazil’s Catholic archbishop and subsequently being kidnapped and tortured by the Brazilian military, to establishing a refugee children’s center at a United Methodist Church in southern California. After decades at the fiery intersection of faith and activism, he is now retired with his wife, Argentina, in Nicaragua. The memoir is available on Amazon.

4 Rams join the Athletics Hall of Fame

Bradley Wright '76

A four-year football letterman and a record holder on the swim team, Wright excelled as an NCAA Division III All-American in doubles tennis. He and tennis partner **Scott Haymond '76** advanced to the quarterfinals at the 1976 NCAA Championships, leading the Rams to a program-best sixth-place team finish.

Rachele Hawkins Crawford '09

At one point Crawford held seven school records in cross country and track & field. She collected four All-Iowa Conference track medals and placed eighth in the mile at the 2009 NCAA Indoor Championships to earn All-America honors. Crawford was a three-time All-Iowa Conference performer and two-time all-region honoree in cross country.

Camille Marie '13

Marie elevated the women's basketball program to record levels during a career in which she scored 1,441 points, second-most by a Ram. The 2013 All-American center and MWC Player of the Year remains Cornell's career leader in made free throws and field goals. A CoSIDA (College Sports Information Directors of America) Academic All-American, Marie steered the 2012-13 MWC championship team to the program's first appearance in the NCAA Tournament.

Griffin LaDew '09

LaDew graduated as Cornell's all-time scoring leader (1,561 points) in basketball and still owns records for 3-pointers made and free throw percentage in a career and season. The three-time all-conference shooting guard guided the team to the 2009 Iowa Conference Tournament title and NCAA Tournament berth. A National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) Scholar All-American, LaDew started 99 consecutive games.

Bill Hovenden '63, Gallatin, Tennessee: “At this time in my life, I am filled with the blessings that have enabled me to live a healthy and adventurous life. To have played college sports and served in Africa as a Peace Corps volunteer has provided me with many fond memories. My dear wife passed out of this world two years ago. She was just 65. Gordon Urquhart PROFESSOR EMERITUS

Professor emeritus **Gordon Urquhart**, who brought an international perspective and lilting Scottish accent to Cornell during his 20 years on the faculty, died July 11, 2024, at age 86 in Jasper, Georgia. Urquhart was a faculty member in the economics and business department from 1984 to 2004, teaching many courses for the international business major. His marketing students assisted Cornell's admission office and also worked with numerous local businesses in developing marketing and business plans. In 1996 research by five of his students found that Cornell students made a \$1 million annual economic impact in Mount Vernon. That study and similar ones with the towns of Lisbon, Springville, and West Branch, were part of Urquhart's work with the state-funded Iowa Leadership Institute.

Urquhart taught adult Chautauqua courses at Cornell and gave lectures on a wide range of economics topics. At the time of his retirement Dennis Damon Moore, Dean of the College at the time, called Urquhart a "consummate humanist" who "considers the world from a multicultural perspective."

He held two master's degrees from the University of Aberdeen in Scotland. Prior to Cornell he taught at Kirkwood Community College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and in England. He also worked for United Brands in the Netherlands and for Rockwell Collins in Cedar Rapids.

Surviving him are his wife, **Sheila Urquhart '02**, two sons and their wives, five grandchildren, and his mother-in-law.



Richard Alfred McCoy '60

A widely traveled foreign service officer, **Richard Alfred McCoy '60** died June 11, 2024, in Laredo, Texas. He was 89.

McCoy served in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1952–1956. He then earned a bachelor's degree in political science and history at Cornell College. During his active and reserve military career, McCoy received the Air Force Commendation Medal and the Air Force and Defense Department Meritorious Service Medals. He retired with the rank of colonel.

McCoy's first career with the Department of State lasted from 1966–1986, and he received the department's Superior Honor Award in 1979. He served as a consular officer in various capacities in San Jose, Costa Rica; Tel Aviv, Israel; Adana, Turkey; Zagreb, Yugoslavia; Georgetown, Guyana; and as country officer in the Office of Caribbean Affairs. He then joined the Bureau of Consular Affairs as special assistant to the assistant secretary. In 1984 McCoy became chief, Career Development Division, Consular Service, in the Bureau of Personnel, retiring in 1986.

He was recalled to duty from 1990–1994 as senior policy advisor to the assistant secretary of state for consular affairs, and again from 1998–2003 to establish a laser visa program and consular outreach sites along the Texas-Mexican border.

McCoy later worked as an immigration specialist in a law office from 2006–2014. He is survived by his wife of 26 years.

Kenneth Charles Kulander '65

After spending a lifetime contributing to the fields of physics and chemistry, **Kenneth Charles Kulander '65** died June 15, 2024, at the age of 80.

His most significant scientific achievements occurred in the late 1980s and early 1990s, which led to his development of the re-scattering model, a groundbreaking achievement that the Swedish Nobel Academy acknowledged as foundational for the 2023 Nobel Prize in Physics.

He began his academic journey at Cornell College and then pursued a Ph.D. in theoretical chemistry at the University of Minnesota, where he met his wife, Monica.

Kulander's career took him to various parts of the world, starting with a three-year stint at the Daresbury Laboratory in Warrington, England. In 1976 Kulander accepted a position as a staff scientist at the Theoretical Atomic and Molecular Physics Group at the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in California. He took sabbaticals at the Max Planck Institute in Munich, Germany, and the University of Colorado in Boulder. Despite retiring from his official position in 1999, Kenneth remained actively engaged in his work for another two decades.

Beyond his career, Kulander pursued various hobbies. He excelled in skiing, swimming, sailing, and running, and was fond of reading and the opera. Kulander is survived by his wife, Monica, his twin brother, John, and two nephews.



Stuart Good HONORARY ALUMNUS

Stuart Good, Cornell College's dean of students from 1957–1969, died Aug. 20, 2024, in Anacortes, Washington. He was 99.

Good led the Office of Student Affairs (OSA) as students began demanding more autonomy. Under his leadership evening dress meals were abolished and coed visiting hours began to expand. Good proposed an advisory board with OSA staff, students, and faculty, which became the Student Affairs Governing Board. The board ultimately passed policy changes such as removing women's hours and allowing students of legal age to drink alcohol in their rooms.

Good served in the U.S. Army from 1943–1946, including in the Southwest Pacific Theater. He then earned bachelor's and master's degrees in English from Boston University, where he worked the first six of his 38 years in higher education. In addition to 12 years at Cornell, he was vice president and dean of students at Westminster College and concluded his career as dean of student affairs at Millsaps College, retiring in 1989.

In retirement Good and his wife, Dorothy, moved to Seattle, Washington, across the street from their daughter and family, and three years later, moved to adjacent lake homes. He is survived by his wife of 74 years, whom he cared for the past two years in home hospice. He is also survived by three children, seven grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.



Wayne P. Engle TRUSTEE

Wayne P. Engle, a Marion, Iowa, business leader and Cornell College Trustee from 1981–1991, died July 22, 2024, at age 91.

Engle joined the Air Force after high school and upon discharge began training as an electrician. In 1964 he and a business partner formed E&S Electric (now The ESCO Group) in Engle's Marion basement. He became active in the electrical contracting industry and served on municipal boards and national associations. Locally he served in numerous capacities for civic and community organizations, including as the originator of the Marion Central Business District Revitalization Project, and as an originator of Marion Square Associates, which acquired seven buildings involved in the revitalization. In addition, he purchased and renovated the Marion Theatre.

He retired in 2006 as chairman of The ESCO Group but became active again after the Iowa flood of 2008 that devastated Cedar Rapids. He formed a group of retired electricians and engineers to provide free wiring and repair to homes damaged in the flood. The group was referred to as Old Farts Electric and served over 300 families. With two other local businessmen, he also co-founded the Marion Cares ministry.

Engle was married to his Ottumwa (Iowa) High School sweetheart, Shirley Ann Johnson, for 68 years. He is survived by a son, daughter, two daughters-in-law, and numerous grandchildren and great-grandchildren.
